# **Course Description**

This course is designed to provide an introduction to the sociological study of race and ethnic relations.

### **Course Objectives**

Upon completion of SOC 168, students will have increased their understanding of:

- the different theoretical perspectives that are used to guide the study of race and ethnic relations;
- the numerous research methods that are used in the study of race and ethnic relations:
- the various sociological concepts that are pertinent to the study of race and ethnic relations; and,
- the assorted historical and contemporary issues associated with race and ethnic relations in the United States.

### **Required Textbook**

# **Requirements and Grading**

# **Religious Holy Days**

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose.
