**COURSE DESCRIPTION: ASE 572.** The course provides a study of the legal basis of school control; the relation of the federal government to public education, the state as the fundamental legal unit in organization and administration of a state system of schools; the district as the unit of local school control; and legal duties and responsibilities of the state and local boards of education.

- 1. A take-home final exam will be distributed and due to be returned, completed at the final class meeting; further information will be provided as the course progresses
- 2. A situation dealing with typical school legal issues will be assigned during the term. Students will develop a <u>written</u> response detailing how the administrator would how handle the assigned situation, based on relevant law applicable to the situation; also each student will <u>present orally</u>, their response to the class for discussion
- 3. Each student will prepare two legal briefs and critiques of important cases in the development of school law as impacting schools today. Each brief will be completed individually and will come from cases either in the course texts or in other materials. In either event, the full text of the case will provide the basis for the legal brief. Briefs should not be more than two type-written, pages utilizing the sample format provided. Students will present a 2-3 minute oral summary of each law case to the class.
- 4. Fact quizzes from text material, or specific topics of interest with be given at least 7 times during the course; at least five of these fact quizzes will be completed outside of class; given that more quizzes (7) will be given than the number required (5) from this activity to earn the maximum points (20) toward the final grade, fact quizzes missed due to absence or not handed in on the due date will be considered as failing; quizzes will be nine questions each; six correct answers are required to earn 4 points per quiz.
- 5. Internship activities as determined by the SHSU graduate faculty must be completed and evaluated as part of the course grade. These activities will then be applied through the required coursework for the Internship course.

Student presentations and participation in discussion of course topics with the teacher, other students, guest speakers, etc., should display verbal expression that reflects the student's understanding and insights as to the content and the student's ability to articulate the same.
