## **TECHNOLOGY:**

# **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

A study of the basic accounting concepts and procedures underlying the organization and reporting of financial information. Emphasis is on the central role of the business and economic information generated by the accounting process and how it is used in personal and business decision making.

# **COURSE OBJECTIVES:** [Learn some new information and how to apply that information]

- 1. The student will know the precise terminology, procedures, and techniques used in identifying, organizing and reporting accounting information for business entities.
- 2. The student will know the fundamental principles and concepts underlying the valuation and disclosure of financial statement accounts.
- 3. The student will understand the economic information contained in company financial statements and what it communicates about the business.
- 4. The student will recognize accounting information as essential to business decision-making.

#### **COURSE EVALUATION PROCESS:**

There will be three exams during the semester plus a comprehensive final exam [a total of four exams]. Course grades will be based on the best two of the three semester exams (30% each) plus the final exam (30%) plus assigned homework (10%). Each student must take the final exam.

Grades will be based on the following scale:

Note that violation of academic honesty can affect the course grade. "Cheating" on an exam (i.e., the giving or receiving of aid) will result in a course grade of "F." See "Academic Dishonesty" below.

Note that classroom behavior that disrupts or distracts (for example, talking to other students during lecture) can negatively affect course grade, e.g., an "A" can become an "F." Do not expect the instructor to tell you that you are talking or that your talking is distracting or that your course grade is falling to a lower grade level; just assume that it is. Whispering, of course, is a form of talking..

**Online homework** is to be completed on My Accounting Lab and must be done as we cover each chapter. For example, the exercises for Chapter 1 will be accepted up to **8:00 a.m.** on the day we start Chapter 2.

#### **CLASSROOM CIVILITY:**

Students are expected to assist in maintaining a classroom environment that is conducive to learning. In order to assure that all students have an opportunity to gain from time spent in class, unless otherwise approved by the professor, students are prohibited from using cellular phones or beepers, eating in class, making offensive remarks, reading newspapers, sleeping, talking among each other at inappropriate times or engaging in any other form of distraction. ## MAKEUP EXAMINATIONS:

There are no make-up exams. One of the three semester exams (but not the final exam) can be dropped in determining course grade.

If there are alphabetical symbols, the calculator will not be allowed. If it has financial ratios etc, it will not be allowed. Cell phones are not allowed.

# **IDENTIFICATION:**

Identification [i.e., current SHSU student identification] may be required to take exams.

## **ASSIGNMENTS:**

See "Assignments" on Blackboard for on-line homework to be done on MyAccountingLab. Assigned exercises and problems may be periodically reviewed in class; students should be prepared to participate. Reading assignments should be completed prior to class.
