COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This course aims to inform the student about the many complex issues involved in adjustment in this time of intense scientific and technological advancement. It is an overview of the psychology of adjustment and should be used as a springboard to create interest and further investigation into the study of effective coping, for both personal change and to foster a better understanding of others.

Course Objectives include:

The student will become familiar with resources available to improve personal adjustment

The student will learn current theories for behavior and be able to apply these theories to explain behavior of self and others

The student will gain a foundational knowledge of personality theory and DSM IV diagnoses

The student will explore and critique their coping style and investigate and implement productive changes

The student will identify areas in their life that need improvement and develop a treatment plan with concrete objectives and goals

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Students are expected to attend class, read all assignments and be prepared to discuss the readings in class. Participation matters and is expected. Attendance will be taken daily. After missing two unexcused class periods of three hours total, the next unexcused absence will mean that you will lose 10 points off your course average. If you miss an additional class period of one and one-half hours, you will lose 05 more points and so on for each additional missed class. An excused absence is a subpoena by a court of law, the funeral of a relative or classmate, a letter from a doctor that you cannot attend class (emergencies and illness only, not a routine appointment which can be scheduled at another time), a receipt or letter from the emergency room that you were there at the time of class or had been admitted in the 24 hours before class, or that you were admitted to the hospital and were there during the class. Doctor appointments should not be scheduled during class. Any excuses require a copy of a document for proof, presented at

the class immediately following your absence. If you leave early without an excused absence, you will be counted absent, unless prior arrangements have been made. It is important to be ON TIME for class.

CLASS ETTIQUETTE:

Do not text message or talk on cell phones during the class. ALL PHONES SHOULD BE TURNED OFF DURING CLASS. Please sit in the same chair each day so I can get to know you. If you are late, a designated chair by the door will be available so that you do not disturb the ongoing class. No eating in class, please, but chewing gum and drinking beverages is OK. Avoid personal conversations with classmates during class. Laughing is encouraged. Please respect the professor and do not attempt to talk with a toothpick in your mouth or a mouth full of snuff. NO Caps during testing of any kind. No laptops please.

Exams will consist of both essay and multiple choice questions. There will be 4- 5 exams during the semester which will be weighted equally.

A short quiz will be given **each** class period over the assigned reading to encourage you to keep up with the readings. All these will be averaged for your Quiz average. This gives you an opportunity to improve your grade if you are not a good "test-taker."

PAPERS

Two well written papers will be scheduled for the semester. Papers should follow the established format, be grammatically sound and well-written with NO spelling errors.

- 1. Each student will explore and identify their current strengths and challenges by investigating personality traits (a list will be provided) giving examples of problem areas and success areas. A treatment plan will be devised to incorporate gaining insight and awareness into behavior and changes that need to be made, along with objectives for reaching goals of changing behavior. You will be given a model of a treatment plan. YOU will choose a problem area, develop a treatment plan and implement it in the frame of the Behavioral Modification theory that we will study.
- 2. Each student will write an autobiography of their life (so far) with emphasis on experiences and events that have lead to learning growth and change (maturation) and or development of "issues" that need to be processed. This paper should be 10 pages double

spaced if you have had any kind of a life at all, and if you want any kind of grade at all. Grammar and spelling errors will count off.

Student Absences on Religious Holy Day Policy:

Section 51.91 (b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence. University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe a religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved, a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a semester session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable time frame in which the missed assignment and /or examinations are to be completed.
