Exams: There will be four regular exams worth 100 points each. The exams will be comprised of multiple choice, true/false and essay/short answer questions. The final exam will be the same format as the regular exams. It will be worth 100 points. The final exam must be taken at the time designated by the University or prior arrangements must be made with the instructor. Make up exams will be in essay format exclusively. Arrangements to take make-up exams must be made with the instructor within one week of the original testing date.

Grading Plan: The grading scale is comprised of a total of 500 points. This includes four regular exams during the semester and a final exam. Grades will be primarily based on exam performance. Please be advised that exam performance is usually greatly affected by attendance. If an opportunity is given for extra credit the student **must** be in class that day to participate.

Study tips: Reading the assigned chapters and class attendance are crucial to academic success in this class. The instructor is available to assist students that may need additional guidance. The SAM center is located in A B 4 on the 2nd floor and it is an excellent resource for students wishing to receive tutoring.
