Course Description:

This course is a study of the various kinds of literature on the basis of their content, form, or technique, with emphasis on the conventions or usages that govern each type. The major genres of poetry, short fiction, drama and the novel will be covered.

Course Objectives:

- 1) To define and explore the genres of literature
- 2) To analyze the different genres of literature by applying critical thinking, reading and writing skills
- 3) To incorporate research skills with essay writing to produce university-level literature-based research
- **4**) To understand, appreciate and enjoy literature. Hopefully, you will enjoy the readings. If you undertake the assignments intending to understand and enjoy, it will be a far more pleasant experience for you

Attendance:

Attendance is mandatory in this course in accordance with SHSU and departmental policy. Students will be allowed 5 absences without penalty. A student's final grade will be dropped 5 points for each absence over five, so choose your absences wisely! Doctors' notes or excuses do not excuse absences or allow additional absences, unless there are serious medical or family emergencies that will cause you to miss over five absences. In that case, you need to contact me for permission to arrange work to be completed outside of class. If a student is absent, he/she is responsible for any assignments or work. It is your responsibility to find out from fellow classmates what work you missed due to an absence. Furthermore, because of recurring problems with tardiness recently, excessive tardies will now count as absences. Three tardies will count as one absence. Withdrawal from class is your responsibility. At the end of the semester, all uncompleted grades will be recorded and averaged as zeros in the final calculation of your semester grade.

Plagiarism:

Plagiarism is defined as claiming someone else's words or ideas as if they were your own creation. This can range from submitting a paper written by someone else as if it was your own work to copying words or sentences from someone else without putting them in quotation marks and properly citing the source. Plagiarism can also mean using someone else's ideas without acknowledging that person as the source. Plagiarism is considered a serious academic and legal offense in our culture. Penalties for plagiarism can range from a failing grade on the assignment to expulsion from the university. In this course, I may require that you submit your essay to a plagiarism detecting service such as turnitin.com. Your enrollment in the course and electing to remain in this section constitutes your agreeing to submit your work, as your instructor requires.

- 2) All papers must be typed, stapled, and adhere to MLA format.
- 3) I expect *everyone* to participate in class discussions of the readings. I give reading quizzes to ensure that everyone is keeping up with the reading (which greatly increases your ability to participate in the discussions!). I do not give make-ups for daily reading quizzes. At the end of the semester, I will drop one reading quiz grade, but any other missing quiz grades, due to absences or tardies, will be counted as zeros.
- 4) You will be required to make one short presentation during our study of poetry. This counts as part of your participation grade and cannot be rescheduled in case of absence.
