Attendance: Not mandatory. You may be absent as you see fit, with the exception of test days. Tardiness: Quiet, unobtrusive lateness is never penalized; take a seat near the back of the room. Grades: There will be a mid-term and a final. Both are primarily objective tests and emphasize reading and translation skills for Middle English. A term paper is optional for all except graduate students, who must submit one. The term paper must be a sociological and historical analysis of one of the medieval vocations or statuses represented by the Canterbury pilgrims (e.g., medieval lawyers; medieval women; medieval friars; parish priests; merchants; etc.). If you do a term paper, it will count 40% of your final grade, and each of the tests will count 30%. If you do not do a term paper, each test will count 50% of your final grade.

**Makeups**: Any missed midterm can be made up (assuming you have a valid health or personal reason for missing) during the 15th or 16th week of classes. Make arrangements with me for a convenient time.

## COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:

The central purpose of this course is to introduce the study of Middle English (ca. 1100-1500) through the works of the most important author of the period, Geoffrey Chaucer. The text customarily deployed for this purpose is *The Canterbury Tales*. As you learn to deal with the various aspects of this text --historical, social, and intellectual-the primary emphasis will be on developing accurate reading and translation skills.
