<u>Course Description:</u> This course will reintroduce graduate students to current methodology employed in the study of the criminal justice system. Emphasis will be place on understanding different methods of research as well as critically evaluating current research in the field. Students will be required to critique current research, work in groups to outline research methodology as well as prepare a research plan of their own design.

#### Course Objectives:

- 1. To provide a more complete understanding of different methods of research.
- 2. To better understand research presented in peer reviewed journals.
- 3. To apply methodology learned in presenting a comprehensive research proposal before the class.
- 4. To understand the effort involved in planning and participating in social science research.
- 5. To be a better, more responsible, social science researcher.

<u>Make-up Exam:</u> A make-up exam will only be considered when a student can demonstrate appropriate cause for missing an exam. The student must inform me prior to missing the exam, or following when the situation is warranted. Students who cannot demonstrate appropriate cause will receive a failing grade for the exam.

<u>Midterm & Final Exam:</u> Each exam will require students to answer multiple essay questions. Questions will include material from all texts as well as class discussions. The midterm will be a traditional closed book exam, while the final will be a cumulative open book test. *Note: I will keep all exams following the class. If you wish to see your test and discuss your grade please make an appointment.* 

<u>Critical Papers:</u> Upon starting Chapter 4 of the Babbie text students will hand in a <u>single typed page</u> critical response paper to articles from the Pope, *et al.* text. These papers will be turned in at the beginning of the class and will be returned at the beginning of the following class. The lowest critical paper grade will be dropped for calculating the final class grade.

<u>Class Participation:</u> As a graduate class it is expected that the students will have opinions and knowledge that they would like and be willing to share. While an open discussion is strongly encouraged, it <u>must</u> be done in a respectful manner.

<u>Research Proposal:</u> Over the course of the semester students will outline a proposed research project. Some class time will be dedicated towards this, however, students should also schedule time outside the classroom toward this endeavor.
