COURSE NUMBER/TITLE: ASE 510 Workshop in School Administration,

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Course Description:

This course deals with current topics in school administration and educational leadership. One semester hour is earned through attending workshops based on needs identified through collaborative endeavors with schools, service centers, professional organizations and government agencies. Students write reflections about those workshops, read a book and write a term paper about a topic selected with the instructor, and interview two professionals with experience related to the topic.

Course Objectives and Activities:

- 1) The student will participate in 'just-in-time learning" that has the potential to enhance professional networking.
- 2) The student will demonstrate the ability to research or read a book, and reflect on a current topic in counseling, school administration or educational leadership. A term paper or book review will be written on the topic.
- 3) The student will attend a minimum of 14 clock hours of instructor-approved workshops, and write reaction papers for each different workshop.
- 4) Students must contact the course instructor by the second Friday after the start of the semester to obtain approval for the workshops to be attended, and research paper topic.

- IV. Append the interview questions with handwritten responses to the questions at the end of the paper.

Option B.

- II. Book review Complete a book review related to the theme of the workshops attended. See book review requirements.

Option C.

 - B. Critical Evaluation
 - C. Implications for your school/school district or work setting.

Complete an "application" assignment under the direction of the presenter of an all day workshop attended.

Book Review Requirements:

- a. State complete information about the book-author's full name, complete title, place of publication, publisher and date of publication.
- b. Author's background.
- c. Purpose of the book.
- d. Scope of the book-Political, social, educational reform, etc.-what are the major themes of the book?
- e. Is there a particular thesis, a new contribution the author is offering? Is there evidence to support the thesis?
- f. Are there basic flaws? What are they?
- g. Are there sections that are exceptionally well done? Commend those sections.
- h. Is the book relevant for educators or counselors?
- i. Does the book make any overall contribution to education or the counseling profession?
- j. What sources does the book use?
- k. Make your review specific as well as general. When you make a generalization, offer one or two specific examples to illustrate.
- l. Review must be descriptive and analytical. What are a few of the author's significant ideas? Why are they important? What disagreements or reservations

do you have? If you say the book is "good" -why? If boring, why? Express your opinions.

6. Submit all work to the instructor by the Friday before the semester ends.

Course Grade

Grades will be assigned as Credit (for students meeting the objectives) or No Credit (for students not meeting the objectives).
