COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is a continuation of SPN 141. Language codes with more complexity are discussed and drilled. Stress is placed on aural and oral skills. Two one-hour language laboratory periods weekly are required. Prerequisite: SPN 141 or the equivalent. *For non-native speakers of Spanish. Native Spanish speakers should take the CLEP or register for 264. Credit 4.

GOALS OF THE COURSE: SPN 142 will continue instruction begun in SPN 141, including the emphasis on conversation, supported by instruction in listening comprehension, reading and writing. At the end of SPN 142, the successful student should be able to make purchases and have a sufficient command of the number system so as to be able to make change in any amount, and negotiate travel arrangements, including the use of military or transportation time. In addition, the successful student will have a command of a larger vocabulary, having augmented that acquired in SPN 141. Students should be able to converse using idioms and other day-to-day utterances that they have learned in SPN 141 and 142.

PLACEMENT EXAM: If you have previous experience with the Spanish language, you should take the CLEP exam to determine your level and to gain credit by examination. Those wanting to take the CLEP exam should sign up with Ms. Terri Harvey, Undergraduate Admissions, Tel 294-1221. She will schedule a time for you to take the exam.

NOTICE – The prerequisite for enrolling in SPN 142 is the completion of SPN 141 with a grade of C or higher or appropriate scores on the CLEP or AP examinations. The prerequisite for enrolling in SPN 263 is the completion of SPN 142 with a grade of C or higher or appropriate scores on the CLEP or AP examinations.
