Course Description

This studio course will survey the print mediums of relief, etching, monoprint, and lithography. Students will explore these media through a guided set of technical/conceptual problems that focus on printmaking as a tool to make cohesive visual statements. Library research will be required during the semester. Projects in part will be based on this research. This is a lab course that for the most part cannot be done at home so expect to spend out of class time working in the studio on your projects.

Course Objectives

- -Understand and master foundation printmaking techniques in each medium
- -Develop conceptual, analytical, and creative thinking skills
- -Develop sound and exhaustive methods in visual problem solving
- -Understand general historical developments in each medium

Policies

- 1. Bring a sketchbook to all class sessions for notes and preparatory sketches. Notebooks may be graded at the mid-term and at the end of the semester.
- 2. Follow shop safety rules and clean up procedures or lose your privilege to work in the shop independently.
- 3. Technical demonstrations are a very important part of this class. Take notes and ask lots of questions!
- 4. Class related Questions???, as long as you have already read the handouts, assignments and calendar I am happy to answer repeatedly until you understand!
- 5. Participate fully in every class because discussion about and viewing other student's prints are very important learning tools.
- 6. Semester end shop clean up is mandatory. If you do not participate your grade will suffer.

Attendance Policy

Late Work

Your project grade will be lowered one letter grade per day after the due date and time.

Not happy with your grade because you missed a concept or technique?

You always have the option to redo and resubmit a project for a better grade after discussing it with me. I will give you the higher of the two grades. All resubmitted work must be turned in prior to the last 2 weeks of class

Academic Dishonesty

The BFA Review

The Art Department began implementing the BFA Review, Spring 2007. Students interested in pursuing a BFA in Art will be required to participate in the BFA Reviews.

Immediately after completing of the 6-foundation art classes (Art 161: Basic Design I, Art 163: Drawing, Art 164: Life Drawing I, Art 265: Basic Design II, Art 271: 3D Design, Art 260: Pre-Renaissance Art History) all students will meet with an Art Advisor and either enroll in the BA degree program or apply for the BFA Program. BFA candidates are required to sign up for a BFA Review or they will be blocked from registering for upper division art classes.

BFA applicants will fill out an application, must have a 3.0 or better GPA and sign up for a portfolio review after completing the first course in their intended concentration. Reviews are conducted each semester by departmental faculty. Students who pass the BFA review will be invited into the BFA Program. Students who do not meet BFA standards will be given feedback on areas that need improvement and will be directed to either reapply for a second review or enroll in the BA program. Students are limited to two BFA applications. Those requesting a second review are advised to consult with faculty concerning their progress and course of action.
