COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an examination of how to improve the ability to communicate through more effective use of the voice. This will be achieved through exploring the basic processes of voice, speech, movement and acting and how they can be further integrated and unified for the performer.

CLASS OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To open the actor's range of speech and vocal choices beyond the habitual.
- 2. To identify each individual's specific speech patterns and begin to address means to expand beyond perceived limitations.
- 3. To prepare the actor for the speech challenges presented by performed text.
- 4. To establish a working knowledge of IPA.
- 5. To work through problems in breathing, resonance, and articulation for each individual student.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Class participation is an important part of class, so it is imperative that you attend all classes. If you are absent from more than **three** (3) classes, your final grade will be reduced by **two** (2) points for <u>each</u> absence. Tardiness is unacceptable. If you are tardy **three** (3) times, that equals **one absence**. Excessive tardiness will result in a reduction of your final grade.

PREPARATION

Please wear clothing that is comfortable and loose fitting, especially on days when we'll be doing floor work. Come to class focused and ready to work. All piercings of tongue, lips and nose should be removed before class time. All students are expected to participate in all activities and exercises. That means 'coming to the party!' Evaluations will be made on all exercises, etc.

RULES OF CONDUCT:

Students will refrain from behavior in the classroom that intentionally or unintentionally disrupts the learning process and, thus impedes the mission of the university. Please turn off or mute your cellular phone and/or pager before class begins. Students are prohibited from eating in class, using tobacco products, making offensive remarks, talking among each other at inappropriate

REQUIREMENTS:

Evaluation Papers: For the department's productions this semester, each of you is required to write a 2-3 page typed paper summarizing the voice and speech work in the production. The paper should focus on the vocal production of the actors and how it impacted the effectiveness of their performance and the overall quality of the production. Papers are due at the beginning of class the Monday following the show's closing. Late papers will not be accepted. Your paper must be double-spaced. Times New Roman or Arial font size 12, with one-inch margins.

Journal and Recorded Assignments: Each student will keep a journal throughout the semester. You are to bring this journal with you to class. Entries will be made regularly during and following class work. Journals will be checked toward the end of the semester for content and participation. In addition to the journal, you will be asked to make various recordings on cassette tape. These recordings will be done outside of class and turned in to me at the end of the semester. At the end of the semester, your last journal entry will be your observations about your completed tape.

Monologue: Each student will be required to choose a serious contemporary monologue that will be worked throughout the semester. If you already have a contemporary monologue in your current audition repertoire, you may use that one. Otherwise, you will need to find one.
