OBJECTIVE:

To learn about what artists use to create a work of art in the theatre. To create and discuss broad definitions of "theatre." To construct meaning (social, personal, political, etc.) from different sorts of performance from various historical periods and places around the world.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Class participation is crucial to any theatre class. It is imperative that you attend all classes. If you are absent more than three (3) classes, your final grade will be reduced by five (5) points For each absence. Don't come to class late. If you are tardy three (3) times that equals one absence. Excessive tardiness will result in a reduction of your final grade.

CLASSROOM DEMEANOR:

This is a class that requires focus and mutual respect. Turn off your phones!

CATALOG COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An analysis of the theatrical experience for the audience. Examination of theatre's relation to the broad contemporary scene and its relation to past eras. Examination of the production elements necessary to provide the theatrical experience.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

This is an active participation class. We will be playing theatre games, doing dramatic readings, and working on creative projects. You will be responsible for reading several plays and articles. YOUR PARTICIPATION IN CLASS IS THE MOST IMPORTANT PART OF YOUR GRADE. It is NOT about knowing answers to questions. It IS about BEING PREPARED, having an open and flexible attitude, being inquisitive, being focused and being willing to be physical and creative in class.

Other than class participation, you will have three (3) assignments:

- 1. To see a performance piece and write a response about it. You could see a play, a stand-up comedian, dance, etc. (We'll talk details when the time comes)
- 2. You will have a mid-term project. This could be a paper, a substantial fine art project, creative writing, etc. (Again, we'll talk details when the time comes)
- 3. You will have a final project.
