Syllabus for Voice Fall 2007

VOI 301 & VOI 302 1hr-4hr credits

TEXT

All music can be checked out from the library or bought. You should purchase at least one book asemester. Penders 1-800-952-7526

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Voice meets three times a week – one private 50-minute session, once on Monday at noon, and Thursday from 3:30-5:00. This course is designed for persons who demonstrate a working knowledgeof music skills and have deemed voice as their primary instrument.

COURSE GOALS

Each student will refine the principals of posture, breath management, and healthy tone production forthe singing voice.

Each student will learn elements of good musicianship, including phrasing, dynamics, intonation, andrhythmic accuracy.

Each student will learn techniques for preparing a song for performance, with more attention todiction, background and style, performance poise, and interpretation.

Each student will learn about the function and care of the voice and about his or her own vocal potential.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Each student will implement the course goals listed above in the preparation and delivery of theappropriate number of pieces stipulated by your level of study (requirements for each level of study are listed below).

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Kindly telephone me and let me know 24 hrs. in advance if you cannot make it to your lesson due toillness or family obligations. I will try and give you the same courtesy. If I miss a lesson, I will makesure to give you the opportunity to make it up. If you miss a lesson, do not expect to receive amakeup lesson unless I have time. However, if you do not give appropriate notice or excuse, doexpect to receive an F as your grade for that particular lesson. You do not get to makeup a mathclass —the same applies here. If I know not to expect you I can make appropriate arrangements. This is a general rule; from time to time we all incur extenuating circumstances, including myself. This is understandable and negotiable at times. Please note that your vocal health is your responsibility.

NATIONAL ASSIOCIATION OF TEACHERS OF SINGING CONFERENCE

All students are strongly encouraged to attend the National Association of Teachers of Singing Texoma Regional and District Conference and Auditions in order to further knowledge and experience regarding vocal music performance. Students in attendance will give verbal reports or performances to the class regarding their experiences. The final jury will include performances of the music presented at the conference.

COLLABRATIVE ARTIST

Each student is responsible for hiring a pianist for the semester. This is equivalent to the purchase of atextbook in any other class and is **non-negotiable**. Each student should find a pianist who is available for the last half of your lesson in addition to a rehearsal time scheduled between the two of you. Respect your pianist! If you are going to miss a lesson or practice time it is your responsibility tonotify them. If you do not give proper lead-time you will be charged.

NOTE: Each student will pay me \$15.00 for the Studio Pianist (Prof. Jay Whatley). This is due before your first performance in studio.

PRACTICE PROCEDURES

As with any skill whether it is a sport, typing, driving a car etc., there is a right and wrong way tomaneuver the particular skill you are trying to achieve. You are trying to learn the proper way to sing. Therefore, you must attempt to do as I instruct to the best of your ability. This requires 30 min. of vocal exercise a day. If I have assigned a piece or any other activity this is to be done in addition to the 30 min. assigned for vocal exercises. Consistency is a must! If you are not consistent you are wastingour time. My part of the bargain is to be clear with my ideas, interested in your progress, creative inapproaches to your problems and your repertoire, and involved in your success. I expect you to doyour half of the bargain. If we both do our very best, good success and growth will be the onlypossible outcome.

Experiment with making new and different sounds and ask me questions!!!!!! This is your time and Iwant it to be as profitable as possible. Drain me of all you can. No question is stupid. It is the best way to learn. If you have questions during practice time, jot it down in your notebook and ask me inyour next lesson.

Please know why you are doing each exercise and its purpose. Practice each exercise in an active frame of mind. Constantly question yourself and try new things. This whole process is an exploration of your mind, body, and soul.

<u>Minimum</u> required practice time for an applied voice course depends upon the number of hourscredit.

3 or 4 hours credit: 10 hours of individual practice each week.2 hours credit: 8 hours of individual practice each week.

1 hour credit: 5 hours of individual practice each week.

ADDITIONAL ASSIGNMENTS

You will keep a Voice Notebook:

Contents:

1) Music

2) **Translations/background info**. Poetry must be memorized and recited prior to working on themusic in your lesson. Translations/IPA should be completed prior to the first lesson on a given piece.Research the necessary info. Have this prepared for your first lesson. I will make copies of theinformation to be shared with the class when sung in studio.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE pieces: Everyone will have at least one piece that is in a foreignlanguage. For every piece that is not in English, you will be required to make an English translation. This means finding the appropriate dictionary and translating the song word for word. After you havedone this, find a sound recording of the piece and check your translation against the one provided in the CD jacket. You can also refer to a published translation to check your work. These can be found in the library. (For information on specific books—see the vocal handbook appendices)

ARIAS: for every aria you sing, you will be expected to research the opera or oratorio from whichit comes. Information that you will be required to find is: background on the story line/libretto;understanding of your character and what s/he experiences in the opera/oratorio; in what part of theopera/oratorio your aria takes place, etc.

- 3) **Lesson Journal**-Bring a cassette tape or **CD-R for music** to each lesson. You are required to writeyour thoughts, attitudes, and opinions on a sheet of paper each week reflecting upon the tape of yourlesson. Often times you can better understand a point I make or a sound you make better after listening to the recording.
- 4) **Practice Journal**-Keep a log of time spent practicing. Within this log notate exercises worked on,questions that arise, music/issues tackled. Remember the practice time requirements discussed previously.
- 5) **Listening Journal** Each student will listen to recording of assigned literature and type a report oneach piece studied using the format designated at the end of this syllabus. You will also turn in yourown list of repertoire to be studied in the Fall that has been researched this semester as a part of yourlistening assignment.
- 6) **Notes-**Keep all handouts from studio for future reference.

<u>FORUMS and STUDIOS</u>. Forum is held each Monday at noon. This offers each voice student the opportunity for soloperformance before his/her peers and faculty. We hope to have other enriching opportunities incorporated into this venue. Majors and vocal concentrates are **required** to attend all scheduled vocal forums and to perform on one forum each semester.

Studio is held each Thursday from 3:30-5:00. This class may run over a bit- please makearrangements accordingly. Each person who is taking voice is required to attend this performance

Each student is expected to attend all faculty or guest recitals and recitals given by studiomembers. For each faculty or guest recital missed without a proper excuse, an F will be entered into the average of studio grades acquired.

REPERTOIRE AND JURY REQUIREMENTS

Repertoire varies each semester according to the educational needs of each student. The generalguideline for freshmen includes 18th and 19th century Italian songs and possibly arias, English andAmerican songs from the 19th and 20th century, with possibly a German song from the standardrepertoire if the student is vocally ready. Sophomores continue with Italian and English songs, definitely add German songs, and may learn some of the easier French mélodies or bergerettes. Junior and senior students continue learning music chosen in conjunction with their teachers which suits thevocal and educational needs of each student. Since each student has different educational needs, operatic arias are assigned when the student is vocally ready.

UPPER LEVEL VOCAL REQUIREMENTS

Students cannot enroll for upper level voice (301X) until they have passed the Sophomore Proficiency

STUDIO GRADE

Lessons are graded based on the number of hours documented on your Practice Log.8 hours practice required a week=12.5 points per hour of practice10 hours practice required a week=10 points per hour of practiceThe theory behind this grade equation is your preparation will directly reflect your product/progress. Your notebook should be checked at each lesson. Each division of the notebook is worth 5 points. These points will be deducted from your weekly lesson grade should your work need to be adjusted. If you do not have practice logs, you will receive a 0 for the weekly grade. If you do not record yourgrade during your lesson time, you will receive a 0.
