Course Description This course is designed to acquaint the student with the biological substrates of behavior. A study is made of the genetic, neuroanatomical, neurochemical, and neurophysiological mechanisms of such psychological processes as sensation, movement, learning, memory, motivation, and emotion. This course id offered primarily for psychology majors and minors but may serve as an elective for majors in biology, chemistry, and public health. Laboratory period required.

### **Course Objectives**

- 1. To gain an understanding of nervous system structure and function.
- 2. To gain an understanding of how the peripheral nervous system interacts with the central nervous system.
- 3. To gain an understanding of neurochemical systems within the nervous systems.
- 4. To gain an understanding how sensory information gets from the environment into the brain, how that information is coded and decoded, and how that information can be used to direct behavior.
- 5. To gain an appreciation for the complexity of systems involved in initiating behavioral processes.
- 6. To gain a general understanding of neurologic dysfunctions belie behavioral/psychological dysfunctions.

# **Grade Policy**

There will be four exams in this course and your grade will be determined by the total number of points accumulated on four classroom exams and a laboratory exam. If you miss an examination, you may take a make-up of that examination, but beware, you may take only one make-up exam during the semester.

#### **Visitors in the Classroom**
