Course Description

This research methods class is designed to provide students with an introduction to social research. Students will be exposed to the logic and character of scientific and alternative means of social inquiry and examination of the functions of observation, concept formation, proposition arrangement and testing of theory as components of the scientific process in Sociology. The main goal of this class is to develop students' insights and abilities to critically read and produce both qualitative and quantitative social research. **Prerequisite courses are: soc131/soc261 and soc264 or instructor permission.**

Course Objectives

By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- 1. Acquire fundamental knowledge and understanding of the fundamental concepts and techniques of social research
- 2. Develop the skills and competencies of social research
- 3. Apply their newly learned skills to practical social research.

Throughout the semester, students will experience the full process of social research including the basic components of social research, structuring social inquiry, various research designs, data collection methods, data analysis, and writing a social research paper. In addition to lectures, students will practice what they learned in the lectures through various class activities and the completion of a series of assignments.

Course Requirements and Grading Plan

Final grades will be calculated by adding all points earned from three exams and four assignments, plus any extra credit points earned during the semester.

Exams

The three exams will consist of multiple-choice, true/false, fill-in, and short-essay questions. The exams will cover the assigned chapters in the lectures and the readings. Each exam will be equally weighted (100 points) for a total of 300 points. Make-up exams will <u>only</u> be given if arranged with the professor prior to the day of the scheduled exam to be missed and only if the instructor considers

the reason for the absence valid. The make-up exams will likely be more difficult than the regular scheduled exams. There will be no cell phones or headphones allowed on exam days.

Assignments

There will be FOUR assignments, each worth <u>25 points</u>. These four assignments will total 100 points of the final grade. Each assignment must be submitted at the beginning of class on the due date. A <u>five point penalty will be assessed for each late assignment</u>. Since some assignments are fundamental for the next ones, failing to understand and complete one assignment on time makes it quite difficult to keep up; thus "falling behind" is to be avoided at all means. If you know you are going to miss a class, inform the instructor and turn in the assignments early to the main office of the Sociology Department. Make sure to ask the secretary (or student worker) to stamp the date and time on your assignment. No late assignments will be accepted after the given date.

Extra credit

Students will have several opportunities to earn extra credit points during the semester. One of these will be review of a film "Grace Lee Project", which will be shown to the class on April 17, 2008. Students are expected to write a **3-page** (double-spaced 12-font) paper about how the researcher prepared and conducted the project and how she analyzed the data in the film. This extra credit paper is worth 10-points. Students have to submit the paper before the class on May 1, 2008 to get credit. Late submissions will not be accepted. Other opportunities to earn extra credit may be announced in class. Furthermore, some extra credit opportunities will be provided as a part of class activities during the class. Those who miss those opportunities due to their absence will not be given another opportunity to earn the points. I will discuss extra credit more as the semester progresses. Earning extra credit is recommended.

Attendance Policy

SHSU policy is that attendance is mandatory. Students are expected to attend all classes and participate fully in class activities. Tardiness will be not accepted. Students will be asked to complete a course/instructor evaluation form toward the end of the semester.

Academic Dishonesty

A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence. "Religious Holy Day" means a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20 of the Tax Code. Students should contact the instructor as soon as possible regarding any missed classes due to "Religious Holy Days".

Classroom Rules of Conduct

Students are expected to assist in maintaining a classroom environment that is conducive to learning. Students shall arrive to class on time and be respectful to their other students. If a student needs to arrive to class late or leave class early the student will make the professor aware of these needs prior to class time. All cell phones, iPods, and beepers must be turned off and stowed away while in the classroom. Students who disrupt the class will be contacted by the professor to adjust their behaviors. In extreme cases students who cannot comply with these requirements can be removed and resigned from the class.
