Course Description: This course is designed to provide students with facts and theories about

the topic of ethnic studies in sociology. At the outset of the semester, students will be exposed to the basic theoretical paradigms of the discipline. Subsequently, this knowledge will be employed to study ethnic and racial social relations, their interpretations, and pertinent debates in current scientific literature. The course will focus on most racial and ethnic groups, religious groups, and women in the United States. Students will become familiar with key concepts - such as culture, minority, ethnocentrism and stratification - and their analytic uses. This is a

freshman level course. No Prerequisite courses necessary.

The Internet

This is an internet course. You are required to have an SHSU e-mail address in order to attend the class. The SHSU e-mail address is necessary to access *Blackboard* which is the software used for the course. It is available in the SHSU web page. To log on, you need to type your SHSU e-mail ID and your SHSU password. Once in Blackboard, click on SOC 168, and you will enter the menu environment. Click on the item that you would like to see to get the necessary information. For instance, if you click on *Course Information* you will see a copy of this class syllabus. If you click on *Assignments* you will read the topic assigned for the day. Take a few minutes to familiarize yourself with the software. **Remember**, all the necessary information concerning the assignments and tests is contained in the Syllabus.

Classroom Meetings There will be no actual classroom meetings. This is a full internet course.

Evaluations:

There will be **two** (2) exams during the course of the semester. Each exam will be equal to one hundred (100) points or fifty percent (50%) of the final grade. These are fifty (50) question- multiple-choice exams that cover material assigned during the class period preceding each exam. These are *NOT* comprehensive examinations. Also, these exams are **open book exams**. Please note that if you log off before completing the exam, you cannot go back and re-start it. Accordingly, an advanced internet connection is recommended. **Students need to log on to Blackboard to take each of the two exams** (see course schedule for the exam dates). **Students will have fifty minutes to complete each of the two exams. Those who take more than the assigned time to complete the tests will be assessed a one point penalty for each additional minute used. Students are required to keep time when taking the tests and are responsible for it. No time warnings are provided**

Grades:

A total of 200 possible points will be available. Grades will be assigned according to the following chart:

Extra Credit

- 2 (two) extra credit points will be given to students who will e-mail summaries of the assigned chapters to Dr. Bonanno. To be accepted, the summaries must have the following specifications.
- Summaries must be at least one single-spaced page long with one inch margin for the top, bottom, left and right sides of the page. Students must use a 12 Times New Roman font. Summaries can be longer than one page. Shorter-than-one-page summaries will be rejected. A full page of text is equal to that page that does not include line breaks between paragraphs and that has no more that one line used to write the student's name on the document. The student's name must appear on the summary.
- Summaries must be sent after the chapter has been assigned and before the assigned deadline. The deadline is the end of the day (12 midnight) specified by Dr. Bonanno. For instance the summary of chapter one "The Study of Minorities" must be sent to Dr. Bonanno by January 22 before the end of the day (12:00 midnight). The summary of chapter 2

"Culture and Social Structure" must be sent before the end of January 29 etc. (see class schedule for due deadlines). Summaries sent after the end of the due day will not be taken into account. Please note that summaries must be received before 12:00 midnight on the due date. The time recorded on your electronic transmission (e-mail) will be used to determine when the summary was sent. Be advised that there can be a discrepancy between the time shown by your computer and that used by the SHSU Computing Services. It is prudent to send you summaries at least 30 minutes before 12:00 midnight.

- Summaries should be e-mailed to Dr. Bonanno (soc_aab@shsu.edu). They can be e-mailed as attachments or pasted to the text of your e-mail. Please use a Word file if you send an attachment. If you do not have access to Word, paste your summary to your e-mail to Dr. Bonanno. Please note that attached file containing programs other than Word may not open under the SHSU computing system. Once a summary is received and reviewed, Dr. Bonanno will send back a short e-mail with the status of the summary (accepted/rejected). In the event that the summary is accepted, the two extra credit points will be posted on Blackboard. The updating of extra credit grades will occur once a week. If you do not receive an acknowledgement within 48 hours from the time you sent your e-mail, assume that your summary was not received. Also, if your extra credit grade has not been updated by the end of the week when you received the acknowledgement, contact Dr. Bonanno immediately.
- Summaries should contain an accurate representation of the assigned chapter. They should review well the items that Dr. Bonanno lists on his "study tips", (see Tasks in Blackboard) and summarize the rest of the chapter. Though personal comments are allowed, they should not be use to substitute for the review of the content of the chapter.
- A total of ten (10) summaries or twenty extra points are allowed. This is a very generous extra credit program. But to take full advantage of it, you need to begin sending your summaries since the outset of the semester. Because you can submit only ten summaries for extra credit, there are a few chapter summaries that you cannot send to receive extra credit. You are allowed to decide which chapter summaries you send in for extra credit.

10 Extra Credit Points can be obtained by writing an essay on the following topic. This essay should be 1,000 words or greater. Essays of less than 1,000

words will not be taken into consideration. E-mail your essays to Dr. Bonanno by MAY 8, 2008.

TITLE OF ESSAY: "Films, music, literature, and philosophy are all cultural expressions that reflect human values and the social contexts within which they are created. For this essay, select a film, a musical piece, a work of literature or philosophy at your discretion and discuss its social and cultural dimensions. Additionally, stress how this work of the arts or humanities has enriched your personal intercultural experience and/or that of your community."

Make up Exams:

There will be **NO SCHEDULED MAKE UP EXAMS**. In the event that a student could not take the test during the scheduled time window, s/he must notify Dr. Bonanno prior to the exam. Dr. Bonanno reserves the right to deny a make up exam.

Academic Dishonesty
