COURSE EVALUATION DESCRIPTIONS:

- -Homework and Quizzes: Homework will be assigned accordingly. Random quizzes will be given in order to encourage attendance to lectures and labs. Quizzes cannot be made up for any reason.
- -<u>Feed Ration</u>: A computerized feed ration will be prepared by each student based on the specifications given by the instructor. Rations will not be accepted late!
- -<u>Commodity Report:</u> See Attached Sheet. Final summary should include your conclusions for each commodity (one paragraph each); cite market fluctuations, price trends, and relationships which occurred during the period of time you charted the markets.
- -Management Plan: Small groups of students will organize as management teams to develop a comprehensive management plan for a stocker/feeder enterprise. Finalized plans will be presented to the class in a 20-minute presentation followed by a 10-minute discussion period. Participation by all group members is critical to the success of the project. Each member must participate in the presentation and discussion.
- -Lecture tests: Lecture test #1 February; Lecture test #2 April; Lecture test #3 May. The lecture tests will include all notes and discussions from lectures. If you miss a test and have a university approved excuse, a make-up test should be scheduled within 24 hours. If a lecture test is missed without a valid excuse, an automatic zero will be assigned.

POLICIES:

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY: As per the SHSU Academic Policy Statement 810213:
