□ Course Description:
Topics include solving of systems of linear equations, fundamental matrix theory, eigenvectors and properties of linear transformations. Remaining topics are chosen from : properties of general vector spaces, inner product spaces, and/or diagonalization of symmetric matrices.  Each class will be primarily lecture-oriented.
□ Required Textbook:
Linear Algebra and $it \square s$ applications by David Lay, 3-rd edition. $\square$ Attendance Policy: Students are expected to attend every class. If class must be
missed, the student is expected to get the notes from a classmate, and to check Blackboard for announcements and updated assignments. Students are expected to arrive to class on time. If a student is perpetually late, they
will be asked not to attend class unless they arrive on time. If tardiness becomes a problem
for the class as a whole, people who arrive late will not be permitted to enter the class
□ Assignments:
1. <b>Homework:</b> Homework will be assigned in class each day. Homework will not be collected, but students are encouraged to check their work with the solutions manual. It is your responsibility to ask questions about homework problems which you were not able to complete or did not understand. It is your responsibility to come to office hours, or otherwise contact someone for help. It is also your responsibility to do as many problems from each section as you need to in order to feel comfortable with the material.  2. <b>Quizzes:</b> There will be frequent short quizzes, consisting of questions from the homework or the previous day □s lecture.  □ <b>Exams:</b> There will be three exams during the semester and a final exam. They are
tentatively scheduled to occur mid February, beginning of March, beginning of April. There will be no makeup exams, except for official University-sponsored activities.

☐ <b>Grading Plan:</b> The course grade is based on:
Quizzes 20% First Exam 20% Midterm Exam 20% Third Exam 20% Final Exam 20% The course grade will be assigned via a standard 10-point scale. There is no additional curve in this class, and no extra credit, so keep up as the semester progresses.
