Grades: There will be a midterm and a final exam, with an optional term paper. Each item will count 50% of your final grade (unless you do a term paper, in which case each item counts 33.3%). If you do a term paper, it must cover a topic that has been approved by me in advance and must cite the lines of the *Gawain* poet in Middle English (i.e., from the Andrew/Waldron edition, not from the Borroff or Finch translations). Current MLA documentation style is required for the term paper. It should be approximately 10 pages, doublespaced, with 1" margins, dealing with a historical or literary-critical topic closely related to one or more of the works of the *Gawain* poet.

## **Attendance:**

COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES: The central purpose of this course is to introduce you to key cultural myths that have shaped the modern Western world. In elucidating these myths, we will be using several important traditional genres of Western literature (especially lyric poetry and prose fiction) and exploring the shifting boundaries and expectations established by these genres. By the end of the course, if you do well, you will have gained a sophisticated understanding of such features of traditional cosmography as Universal Harmony, the Great Chain of Being and *Contemptus mundi*.
