# FCS 463 Merchandising Control 3 hours credit Spring 2008

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Techniques of merchandise control including retail mathematics involved in markup, markdown, stock control, open-to-buy, inventory control, pricing and financial statements are studied. Consideration is given to managerial decisions based on the mathematical information encountered in retailing. This course is a prerequisite for FCS 469 Internship. Consent of instructor is required if student has not completed FCS 371 and ACC 231. This course will include lecture, student discussions, and student participation in problem solving. Homework problems will be assigned and will serve as a basis for class discussions. Progress throughout the course will be contingent upon the class's grasp of the material.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

Merchandise control is essential in fashion retailing. This course involves computation of mark-up, markdown, open-to-buy, maintained mark-up, and pricing. Upon the completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- 1. identify terms of purchase.
- 2. compute on percentage and the single-discount equivalent.
- 3. identify discounts and terms of dating.
- 4. compute individual mark-up in dollars or percent based on cost or retail.
- 5. compute cumulative mark-up, initial mark-up, maintained mark-up, and relate those items to gross margin.
- 6. apply stock turnover rate to merchandise control.
- 7. calculate open-to-buy dollars.
- 8. perform basic mathematical computations frequently performed in merchandising.
- 9. assess management decisions based on numerical information.

- survivor of the deceased) before the make-up exam can be administered.
- 2. Homework assignments are due at the <u>beginning</u> of the class period for which they are assigned. Late homework assignments will not be accepted. Each homework assignment <u>not</u> completed will result in a loss of 5 points on the homework/daily grade, and homework assignments are graded according to whether the homework was <u>attempted</u>. Students <u>must</u> show their work on homework, quizzes and exams; answers alone do not count! Homework problems must be written legibly.
- 3. Quizzes must be taken on the day that they are given. No make-ups are allowed for quizzes. These quizzes are given so that students will keep up with the material and not postpone studying until the "last minute."
- 4. When working problems for quizzes and exams, students <u>must</u> show all of the steps in the work in order to receive credit.
- 5. All assignments must be completed and turned in to the professor before the final exam can be taken (*Undergraduate Catalog*, p. 74).
