Course Description:

This course will examine issues regarding the nature and extent of crime, with particular focus on classical / neoclassical, biological, psychological, and sociological theories of crime causation. It will also examine theories' application to, and policy implications in the address of, various classifications of crime, namely persons, property, drug, and white collar crimes.

Course Objectives: Students will be able to:

- Identify and describe common research methods and sources of data used by criminologists in the study of crime
- Identify and describe various theories of crime causation, including their major principles, critiques/limitations, and policy implications
- Develop critical thinking in regard to the various theories of crime causation
- Discuss theory application to various classifications of crime

Course Requirements and Grading:

Exams: (100 points each for a total of 400 points)

Students will be given four exams (not comprehensive). The tests will be comprised of 45 multiple choice (2 points each) and two short answer (5 points each). Make-up exams will be given only upon prior approval of the instructor.

Assignments: (10 points each for a total of 50 points)

Students will be required to complete 5 of 7 assignments. These assignments consist of reading excerpts provided by the instructor which coincide with topics of discussion, and answering the attendant critical thinking questions. Assignments shall be turned in to the instructor the class period following their issuance.

Extra Credit Opportunity: (up to 10 points added to final point total) Students will be given an opportunity to turn in an extra credit assignment, comprised of a one to two page paper. Details will be discussed in class.
