COURSE DESCRIPTION: Focus is on managing the security organization. Discussion on result oriented management will be emphasized. The basic foundation of security management and the importance of both technology and specialized security applications will be discussed. You will be assigned a management topic for research. You will, in teams, develop a security business plan. The term project will result in a comprehensive business proposal that will be in written format. It will also be presented orally utilizing contemporary multi media applications. By working independently and in teams, you will utilize all aspects of your security management texts to bring a real world application to your academic endeavors.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Cover the assigned texts as outlined in the attached schedule. Other outside readings will be assigned

on a weekly basis. This will acquaint students with a wide overview of the security management process. From class readings, lectures, independent research and working as team members, you will be expected to develop a plan for the successful operation of a security business. This plan will be in the form of a proposal. It will integrate all issues appropriate in security management. This will include, but is not limited to, threat assessment, risk assessment, budgeting, physical security, and human resources. The student, will at the end of the term, have a working knowledge and understanding of the dynamics of security operations, management, and its future in the contemporary business world. The term paper you are assigned will allow each of you to investigate a particular area of security management and integrate the learned principles into the team project.

You will be subject to automatic reduction in grades due to poor attendance.
