## SPN 374 Introduction to the Literature of Spanish America.

Study of the texts of Spanish-American writers from the Conquest to the present with emphasis given to the historical, cultural, and political factors which influenced their writing. Instruction in Spanish. Prerequisite: SPN 361, the equivalent of SPN 361, or consent of the instructor. Credit 3.

**STYLE.** This course will be a combination of lecture, group discussion, and student reports. Part of a student's success will depend on arriving at class well prepared and able to respond quickly (in Spanish) when called on. SPN 374 is designed to expand the student's knowledge of Latin American literature. Classes are conducted in Spanish.

### COURSE OBJECTIVES.

- To increase the student's <u>awareness</u> of the contributions of Latin American literature
- To provide a <u>background</u> for understanding events in this region, both historical and present-day
- To gain factual knowledge about Latin American literature and its major writers
- To develop <u>competency in analyzing</u> literature and understanding various genres and modes of expression
- To improve the student's expression of oral and written academic Spanish
