# **Course Description:**

An introduction to criminal justice designed to expose students to the diverse and complex criminal justice system. Students will acquire a thorough and comprehensive understanding of crime and justice in the United States.

#### **Course Objectives:**

- 1. Introduce the laws, procedures, and policies involved in procession an offender through the criminal justice system.
- 2. Allow students to develop an understanding of roles and responsibilities of various officials involved in the court system.
- 3. Examine the police role, the judicial system function, and correctional techniques used in dealing with offenders.
- 4. Familiarize the students with the history of the public's attitudes toward the offender and the resulting changes in laws, systems policies, and legal practice.
- 5. Analyze and evaluate the future of the CJ System.
