Course Description

A study of the basic techniques of instrumentation, including ranges, transpositions, and characteristics of band and orchestral instruments. Practical application in the form of projects for various instrumental combinations. The final project will involve transcribing a short piano piece for orchestra or wind ensemble/band.

Course Objectives

- To have a thorough understanding of the orchestra and its instruments.
- To gain the confidence and capability to transcribe and compose for orchestra and wind ensemble/band.

Attendance

Regular and punctual attendance will be expected of you throughout the semester. University policy permits **two (excused or unexcused) absences** without penalty (except for announced tests). (That's a whole week of this class!) Reserve these for possible emergency or illness. For each additional unexcused absence, one-half of a letter grade will be deducted from your final grade. Valid excuses include official university functions, serious illness or family emergency with an acceptable explanation/note. **NO EXCEPTIONS!!!** If you anticipate a legitimate absence on a test date, contact me **well in advance** so that a make-up test can be scheduled. Once a test has been returned (usually the next class meeting), a make-up test will **not** be possible. You are responsible for all assignments and material covered on the days of your absence. If you miss a quiz, you will receive a 0 (zero) whether excused or not. I will drop your 2 lowest homework or quiz grades. Tardiness will be counted as one-third off your attendance for the day (in other words – 3 tardies equal an absence). **Attendance is likely the most significant factor affecting your success in this course.**

Class Participation

When you come to class, be prepared to participate in discussions and other activities involving the assigned readings, exercises, and pieces. Bring your questions to class!

Presentation

Each student will be required to give a short (10-20 minutes) presentation during the semester. Subject matter will be chosen by the instructor. This is worth 10%.

Homework Policy

Homework assignments are due at the beginning of class and will not be accepted late. Exceptions will be made only in cases of serious illness or death in the family. Students who receive unsatisfactory marks (79 or below) will have the opportunity to resubmit an assignment to the instructor by the following class after the assignment is returned. You can receive up to half of the points missed and a grade no higher than an 80. Any homework that is two or more pages MUST be stapled or will not be accepted.

Final Project

The final project will involve transcribing a short piano piece for standard orchestra or wind ensemble/band (details forthcoming). The piece you choose to orchestrate **MUST be approved by the instructor on or before Feb. 12**. You will be required to use Finale or Sibelius to supply legible parts, a double-sided, bound, legible score, and you must acquire a conductor, as the piece will be read by either the orchestra or wind ensemble. If you have taken Conducting I and II, you may choose to conduct the piece yourself. Otherwise, a list of prospective conductors will be handed out later in the semester. Please note this is worth 35% of your grade. I have high standards for this class, and expect this to be of the highest quality. (Helpful Hint: begin this project early in the semester. Don't wait until the last minute.)
