Course Description: Biology 162 is an introductory biology course for biology majors, pre-health professionals, or those needing an in-depth biology course. General principles of zoology are presented in an evolutionary context. Emphasis is placed on the anatomy, behavior and ecology of animals. *There are no prerequisites for this course.*

Course Objectives: At a minimum, you should learn and understand the principles of zoology through acquisition of:

- 1. a basic working vocabulary
- 2. knowledge of the theories and principles of evolutionary biology as they apply to the systematic arrangement of the major animal taxa
- 3. the characters and systematic arrangement of the major animal taxa

Required text: *Integrated Principles of Zoology 13th edition*, by Hickman Roberts & Larson.

Required supplies: Scantron forms 882-E and Quizstrip no. 815-E, and a #2 lead pencil

EVALUATION: 4 lecture exams @ 100 points each = 400 points

10 quizzes @ 10 points each = 100 points 5 assignments @ 20 points each = 100 points TOTAL POINTS = 600 points

GRADING: Grades will be based on total points earned by the student throughout the course. Grades will be determined on a percentage basis as follows:

A = 540+ B = 480-539 C = 420-479 D = 360-419 F < 360

Attendance and Performance: In accordance with University policy, I expect regular and punctual attendance of each of you. However, no points will be awarded or subtracted based on your attendance. Exam questions will be taken primarily from material presented in lecture, although a few questions on each exam will come directly from your reading assignments. The textbook is to help you with spelling, visualization, clarification, and review of what we do in lecture. In other words, the textbook can help you prepare for and understand topics covered in lecture, but the lecture information is crucial for complete test preparation.

I have office hours and am available by appointment at other times to answer your questions. Please remember that **YOU PAID FOR THIS COURSE**. You have hired me to teach you what I know and think is important about zoology. Whether you make full use of me is entirely up to you. **I WILL NOT PURSUE YOU**. If you wish to use your investment wisely you should attend all of the lectures, read your textbook and if confused come talk to me. If you do not do well on the first exam, or feel swamped, you need to come see me early in the semester. April is not a good time to decide to pull up your grade. There will be **NO** extra credit projects. If you don't have time to study for exams, how will you find time for extra credit?

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Exams: There will be four exams during the semester and a comprehensive exam during the scheduled final exam period for a total of five exams. All exams will consist of 50 multiple choice questions and will be given during the designated lecture time-slot (see accompanying schedule). Each exam (including the comprehensive final) will be worth 100 points. I will drop your lowest exam score.

Quizzes: There will be 12 unannounced quizzes (i.e. pop quizzes) each worth 10 points. Quizzes will consist of five multiple-choice questions. I will drop your two lowest quiz scores. Because the quizzes are unannounced, it will be to your advantage to keep up with your biology studies. To encourage you to be on time, quizzes will be given at the beginning of class and will last exactly six minutes. If you are late to class you will not be given extra time. If you are more than six minutes late to class you get a zero for that quiz—**NO EXCEPTIONS**.

Assignments: There will be five assignments, each worth 20 points, spaced approximately evenly throughout the semester. Assignments will vary in nature, but will generally require you to use resources other than your lecture notes or your text to earn the full credit for the assignment. Assignments will be posted on Blackboard and I will announce in class when a new assignment has been posted.

Make-Up Policy: Because you are able to drop your lowest grade, there will be absolutely NO make-up examinations during the semester. If you miss a regularly scheduled lecture exam, FOR ANY REASON, you will be required to take the comprehensive final. If you know in advance that you will miss an exam because of a religious event or because you are conducting official Sam Houston State University business, you may make arrangements to pre-take the test provided that you supply written verification for the reason you will miss the exam.

COURSE POLICIES

CLASSROOM RULES OF CONDUCT: Students are expected to assist in maintaining a classroom environment that is conducive to learning. Students are to treat faculty and students with respect. Students are to turn off all cell phones while in the classroom. Under no circumstances are cell phones or any electronic devices to be used or seen during times of examination. Students may tape record lectures provided they do not disturb other students in the process.
