# **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course is a continuing examination of how to improve the ability to communicate through more effective use of the voice. This will be achieved through continuing to explore the basic processes of voice, speech, movement and acting and how they can be further integrated and unified for the performer.

# **CLASS OBJECTIVES:**

- 1. To continue to open the actor's range of speech and vocal choices beyond the habitual.
- 2. To further identify each individual's specific speech patterns and begin to explore a variety of dialects beyond the habitual.
- 3. To prepare the actor for the speech challenges presented by heightened/classical text, specifically Shakespeare.
- 4. To solidify a working knowledge of IPA as it applies to dialects.
- 5. To continue working articulation, diction and placement for each individual student as it applies to dialects.
- 6. To further explore the challenges presented by stage speech.

#### ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Class participation is an important part of class, so it is imperative that you attend all classes. If you are absent from more than **three** (3) classes, your final grade will be reduced by **two** (2) points for <u>each</u> absence. Tardiness is unacceptable. If you are tardy **three** (3) times, that equals **one absence**. Excessive tardiness will result in a reduction of your final grade.

### **PREPARATION**

Please wear clothing that is comfortable and loose fitting. Come to class focused and ready to work. All piercings of tongue, lips and nose must be removed before class time. ### REQUIREMENTS:

**Evaluation Papers:** For each of the department's productions this semester, you will write a 2-3 page typed paper summarizing the voice and speech work in the production. The paper should focus on the vocal production of the actors and how it impacted the effectiveness of their performance and the overall quality of the production. Papers are due at the beginning of class the Monday following the show's closing. Late papers will not be accepted. Your paper must be double-spaced. Times New Roman or Arial font size 12, with one-inch margins and MLA formatting.

**Journal:** Each student will keep a journal throughout the semester. You are to bring this journal with you to class. Entries will be made regularly during and following class work. Journals will be checked toward the end of the semester for content and participation.

**Monologue:** Each student will be required to choose a Shakespeare monologue, preferably one that you can add to your audition tool bag.

**Shakespeare Scenework:** Each of you will be required to work on a two-person scene, no longer than 5 minutes in length.
