COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The purpose of this course is to give students an insight into environment in which businesses operate and to provide them with a basic understanding of solving problems using legal rules. It may be elected by nonbusiness students.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Students will be expected to:

- 1. Develop the ability to recognize legal problems that arise in common business transactions.
- 2. Know selected legal rule and their impact on the decisions made in operations of businesses.
- 3. Develop the analytical thinking process by the application of legal concepts in the solving of problems.
- 4. Understand the environment in which business decisions are made and the effect of those environs on the decision process.

COURSE EVALUATION PROCESS:

The grade for the course is based on the three unit exams plus the final exam, class participation, observation by the professor which demonstrates knowledge and extra credit participation as available Course averages are determined on the following basis:

 \approx 66% -- Three (3) major examinations

The 1st exam grade of these three (3), May be dropped if that grade is lower than the other grade on exams including the Final exam. Each exam is comprehensive.

≈33% -- comprehensive final exam

Grades in this course are determined by applying the following scale to a student's average:

There will be no early finals or other examinations given for any reason.

RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY:

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable time frame in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.

HANDICAPPED STUDENT POLICY:

ATTENDANCE & CLASS POLICY:

Attendance in this class is expected as is stated in the latest Sam Houston State University catalog. The penalty for excessive absences, which is defined as ten (10) hours, is automatic failure, (a grade of "F") for the class. Also, those who miss a substantial number of classes will penalize themselves by missing material that will be discussed in class, that may not appear in the texts, and over which the class will be tested. If a student is consistently late, consistently late means greater than 3 times late, each late arrival in excess of 3 will be considered an absence. Students leaving, without permission, before the class is dismissed will also be considered absent. Student who must miss a class may receive attendance credit for that day by attending another session of the class that day and notifying the instructor of their presence.

Any examination missed because of an absence must be made up at the end of the semester when one (1) comprehensive make-up examination will be given to all students who missed examinations. If more than one (1) exam was missed, the makeup will count for each of the missed exams -- that is, if one (1) exam is missed the make-up will count once, if two (2) exams are missed the exam will count twice, etc.

Students are considered to be learning how to become a part of the business community and are expected to dress and act accordingly. **No hats** are to be worn in the class room. University policy prohibits **Food & drink** in Classrooms.
