Course Description:

This course is one of the 710 series courses and is designed to introduce students to mentoring graduate students and the characteristics of a good mentor.

- Students will learn about the benefits of a mentoring program, and how to develop, implement, and evaluate the success of a mentoring program.
- Course activities cover selecting mentors and the people to be mentored, defining the mentor's job, matching mentors, establishing strong mentoring relationships, and maximizing the benefits of mentoring.
- Students also learn how to set effective goals and become effective learners when they are being mentored, and how to choose a mentor.

Course Requirements:

- Networking Plans
- Mentors/Mentees Publishing and Presenting

Prepare an abstract using a current research article about mentoring graduate students. Prepare a five page abstract to include a brief summary of the article and a personal reflection. The reflection should include a critique of the article, including points of interest/concern/disagreement, etc., how you might utilize the information presented as a mentor or mentee, recommendations, etc. (20 points)
