Accounting is a key discipline of business. It keeps track of what a business has, what it owes, what it earns, and how much it costs to earn it. Accounting has been called the <u>DOS of money</u> – the underlying system that measures a company's performance and it's position for future accomplishment. All business decision makers depend on the accounting system to provide the reliable, relevant financial information that is a part of almost all business decisions. You need to understand how the accounting system works so you can understand the information it provides. That way you – whether you are managing a company, investing in a company or lending it money – will make better business decisions.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

A study of the basic accounting concepts and procedures underlying the organization and reporting of financial information. Emphasis is on the central role of the business and economic information generated by the accounting process and how it is used in personal and business decision making.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

In Accounting 231, Principles of Accounting, students will learn

- 1. **The precise terminology, procedures and techniques** used in identifying, organizing and reporting accounting information for business entities.
- Fundamental principles and concepts underlying the valuation and disclosure of financial statement accounts.
- 3. **And understand the economic information** contained in company financial statements and what it communicates about the business.
- 4. How accounting information is used in business decision-making.

COURSE EVALUATION PROCESS:

The course grade will depend on a student's performance on exams, quizzes and other assignments:

Letter grades will be assigned as follows: A = 90%; B = 80%; C = 70%; D = 60%; F = less than 60%.

No make-ups on exams will be given. The score on the comprehensive part of the final exam will count for the missed exam grade. You must take the final exam. The score on the comprehensive part of the final (if higher) will be substituted for the lowest grade on the first three exams. Only one exam score can be replaced with the final exam. A student who misses more than one exam must make it up in the required time or receive a zero on the second missed exam.

Quizzes, class work or other assignments will be given throughout the semester. They may be announced or unannounced. You must be present in class for the quiz or class work assignment. There are **no make-ups** on quizzes and no late assignments will be accepted. <u>Quizzes will be based on homework assignments</u>. **Homework** may be completed on My Accounting Lab or by had and should be done as we cover each chapter.

Have Fun / Do Good Reports Due no later than Monday, June 30.

Having Fun Too often students are stretched with studies, jobs and other responsibilities and the pressures of life can be overwhelming. It is important to maintain a broader perspective. To assist you, this class rewards you for having some fun. You will be given 5 points to embark on an adventure this semester and turn in a report on it, a simple, typed one-paragraph description of what you did. For our purposes, an adventure will be defined as something fun that you would not have taken the time to do except for this assignment.

Doing Good Also, it is important to remember the value of service in our everyday lives. When we take the time to look beyond our own problems and serve others, we not only help them but lift ourselves as well. For 5 points do a simple act of service during the semester and report it in a short one-paragraph report, typed and submitted to me. This does not need to be elaborate service, even doing chores for a spouse or roommate or assisting a co-worker is great if done in the proper spirit.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Class attendance is a requirement and essential to success in the course. Roll will be taken at each class meeting. I do not, however, add or subtract grade points for attendance itself. You should also be on time and prepared. Develop a professional attitude: take responsibility for your performance and do those things that lead to success.

- **KEYS TO SUCCESS IN ACCOUNTING 231:** *The Good News:* No higher math (calculus or trig) is required. The math involved is basic (+, -, X, /, %; and simple algebra). *The Other News:* What is important is the ability to organize and analyze information. You will use the accounting system and concepts to do, essentially, word problems. Also, business language and terms are carefully defined and business communication requires the precise and proper use of those terms. You will need to know and be able to use these terms appropriately.

You are the player/performer in this class. I am the coach (and occasionally the umpire). Accounting 231 requires more time and a higher level of self-discipline than many college courses. You cannot afford to get behind. You need to read and work problems regularly, preparing for each class. Do not try to learn three chapters of material the night before an exam. The result will not be pretty. Set yourself up to succeed: Give yourself time and do not cram too much (courses, jobs, organizations) into your schedule.
