ENG 360 SURVEY OF AMERICAN LITERATURE, BEGINNING TO 1865. A survey of themes, genres, and authors in American literary history from the period of exploration and settlement through the American Renaissance and the Civil War. Required of all English majors; also required of all English minors not seeking certification. Prerequisites: 9 hours of English. Credit 3.

American literature includes literature from the native tradition as well as literature from the European tradition. Although literature from many different languages have been written on the North American continent, most surveys of American literature concentrate on that originally written in English and this course will be no different. However the American tradition developed a new style and sensibility as it dealt with themes not addressed by Europeans. Americans also developed different genres and techniques within the literary tradition. The aim of this course is to familiarize you with many of the significant writers during this time, some of the ways that American writers created new techniques and genres, and to develop an understanding of uniquely American themes.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. You are expected to come to class having done the reading listed for the day and be prepared to discuss it, write about it, or take an objective quiz on it. All of the course readings are available on the Internet. We will be reading all of *The Scarlet Letter* and *Walden* so you may want to purchase a copy of those. I encourage you to print off a hard copy of each reading and bring it to class with you.
- 2. You will do some in-class assignments such as written responses to the readings or objective guizzes as well as in-class discussion.
- 3. You will do a group teaching project. A description of the project is available on Blackboard.
- 4. There will be a take-home mid-term exam. It will consist of essay questions. You will need to type it and either bring a hard copy to class or submit it to through Assignments on Blackboard by noon on the day it is due.
- 5. There will be a comprehensive final exam.

GRADES:

Grades are posted on Blackboard. You will need to check your grades to be sure that they accurately reflect the grade on your written work. Grades are given on a point system and the final course grade is based on a percentage of the total semester points.
