Course Description: This course is designed to meet the objectives of Component area 2 of the core curriculum for non-business and non-science related majors. Topics may include sets, counting principles, probability, logic, mathematics of finance, geometry, number theory and problem solving techniques. Applications are emphasized. Lectures will be given, daily homework will be assigned, quizzes and four exams will be administered throughout the semester.

Prerequisites: Two years of high school algebra and high school geometry.

Text: We will be using the following text:

C. Miller, V. Hereen, and J. Hornsby <u>Mathematical Ideas</u>, 11th Edition, Pearson Addison-Wessley, 2007. It is the responsibility of the student to obtain all course materials at the beginning of the semester. We will be using the text in class and the student is expected to have their own copy during class time.

Required Supplies: *Scientific calculators are required*. Each student must use his/her own calculator. A recommended calculator would be the TI-83 Plus as the text provides tutorials for proper usage. Any comparable scientific calculator would suffice. Each student must bring his/her own writing instrument and notebook.

Course Objectives: We will be covering the following chapters:

Chapter 2 Introduction to Set Theory
 Chapter 3 Introduction to Logic
 Chapter 14 Consumer Mathematics

• Chapter 15 Graph Theory

Attendance Policy: Regular and punctual attendance for this course is mandatory and a record of attendance will be maintained throughout the course. The student is responsible for obtaining any assignments or notices given during the date of their absence. For all documented and university-approved absences (e.g. hospitalization, court appearances, university athletic conferences, etc...) students must immediately contact and inform the instructor of the situation and present proper documentation upon re-entering the classroom.

Homework: Homework will be assigned for every class period. Students are expected to complete the assignment by the following class day. Students are expected and encouraged to work cooperatively on these assignments. The homework will be collected and recorded for extra credit.

Exams: There will be three (3) in-class exams and a final exam. The final exam is on Chapter 15 and will be given on Friday, June 27. The first three exams are tentatively scheduled below.

- Exam 1 (Chapter 2): Friday, June 6.
- Exam 2 (Chapter 3): Friday, June 13.
- Exam 3 (Chapter 14): Friday, June 20.

For university-approved and documented absences, the final exam grade may replace one and only one missing exam grade.

A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
