Course Description:

Catalogue Description: A survey of the major monuments of Painting, Sculpture, Architecture, Textiles and Metalwork from the Paleolithic period through the Fourteenth Century. Prerequisite: None

Overview: This course focuses on the art of the pre-modern societies whose art and culture provided models for many of our parameters for production and judgment of art. We will explore the art and architecture of Europe as it developed from the Prehistoric period to the Gothic period (35,000 BCE to 1500 CE) in conjunction with the visual arts of the Near East, Africa, Asia, and the Americas. In so doing we will attempt to decipher the intentions and motivations behind art's production and, thus, what art tells us about the artist and its culture of origin.

Course Objectives:

The objectives of this course are to assist you in:

- gaining knowledge of terminology, stylistic classifications, methods, and theories employed in Art History
- gaining a broader understanding and appreciation of art within its diverse cultural and historical contexts

Course Requirements:
