WRITTEN COMPREHENSIVE EXAM EVALUATION INSTRUMENT

After completing the necessary coursework for an MA in History, each student at SHSU must pass both a written and an oral comprehensive exam to complete his or her degree requirements. The written exam is a three-hour test that focuses on three historical fields selected by the student. Each field is represented by a different faculty member on the student's comprehensive exam committee. Each faculty member will judge the essay submitted for his or her field of the exam according to the following instrument.

| | (A) HIGH PASS |

A grade of High Pass is awarded to an essay that

- (1) offers a skillful and polished answer to the question presented and follows the guidelines provided by the faculty member;
- (2) demonstrates an exceptional knowledge of the relevant historical content, including numerous specific references to individuals, groups, trends, or events that shaped the period or topic;
- (3) demonstrates an outstanding understanding of the historiographical subtleties of the field, while also comparing and contrasting specific works and authors;
- (4) demonstrates a ability to make significant and sophisticated arguments about the historical subject, while also presenting those arguments in a clear, logical, and concise manner.

(B) PASS

A grade of Pass is awarded to an essay that

- (1) offers a direct and proficient answer to the question presented and follows the guidelines provided by the faculty member;
- (2) demonstrates an adequate knowledge of the relevant historical content, including specific references to individuals, groups, trends, or events that shaped the period or topic;
- (3) demonstrates an competent understanding of the historiographical issues in the field, while also comparing and contrasting works and authors;
- (4) demonstrates a ability to make general arguments about the historical subject, while also presenting those arguments in a logical manner.

(C) FAIL

A grade of Fail is given to an essay that

- (1) fails to address the question or follow the guidelines provided by the faculty member;
- (2) fails to demonstrate graduate-level knowledge of relevant historical content, or makes no mention of key individuals, groups, trends, or events that shaped the period or topic;
- (3) fails to demonstrate a competent understanding of the historiographical issues in the field, or makes no mention of works and authors;
- (4) is incoherent or ill-organized, or fraught with construction, grammar, and usage problems.

A student who fails an area or areas is allowed one opportunity to retake the examination in the failed section(s).
