COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The major objective of this course is understanding of statistical multivariate and its applications. We will cover the concept in multivariate normal distribution, inferences about mean and variance vector. We also study discriminant analysis, classification procedures, principal component, factor analysis and canonical correlation analysis.

I will cover most of the material in Chapters 1 through 12 of the text book. Sections that are to be omitted, if any, will be announced.

STUDENT ABSENCES ON RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY:
