Course Description:

A brief overview of scientific crime detection and more detailed discussion of techniques for case management and documentation, the concepts of proof, the impact of emergent technology on the investigative process, interaction with victims and witnesses, and interviewing suspects.

Course Objectives:

- 1. The student will learn basic principles and practices of criminal investigation.
- 2. Introduce the student to some techniques and tools used in the criminal investigation process.
- 3. Examine issues pertaining to major crimes and how they are investigated.
- 4. Use some of the techniques and tools learned to process a mock crime scene.

Attendance Policy:

Students will work in groups with each person assigned to individual tasks similar to realistic criminal investigations. Any person not carrying their load will be graded accordingly.
