Required Texts / Supplies: *Deutsch Na Klar* (5th ed.) with ancillary materials. (A workbook is packaged with the textbook). Writing implements, notebook paper and a pocket dictionary for in class use. (The last item is optional).

Description of the Course

This course is intended to be an introduction to German language and culture for students who have no previous background or instruction in German. Students who have recently completed one or more years of high school German should consider enrolling for a more advanced course. During the semester all aspects of the German language will be taught, to include: listening, speaking, reading and writing. There will be an emphasis on practical aspects of language learning and daily oral practice in the classroom. The course also includes discussions of the cultural traditions found in the German-speaking countries of Europe (Germany, Austria and Switzerland, et al.).

The course has two delivery methods: an on-line BLACKBOARD for information outside class meetings and an in class student-centered format. Classes will be activity and participation oriented with a minimum of lecture time. Lectures and discussion will be conducted in both English and German, but by the end of the semester will be predominately in German. Since language is a social skill and activity, participation is expected in every class period. Mistakes are natural and will occur frequently in the beginning. Do not be concerned about saying everything perfectly the first time. Be flexible--think of another way to send the same message if you get "stuck." Remember: you will be evaluated based on the **effort** you put into the classroom exercises and your attitude, not on whether you get the answers right the first time.

*There is a lab session required for this course, for which you must sign up separately.

COURSE GOALS and OBJECTIVES

1. To increase <u>AWARENESS</u> of and <u>APPRECIATION</u> for German language and culture.

2. To acquire a minimal **<u>VOCABULARY</u>** in German which can be used in commonly encountered social situations in German speaking countries.

3. <u>GRAMMAR</u>. to learn about nouns and gender, definite and indefinite articles and personal pronouns; to be able to conjugate regular, stem-changing, irregular verbs, modals and separable prefix verbs; to understand the forms of negation; to be able to use

the various forms of the imperative; to be able to distinguish between the nominative, accusative and dative cases; to learn and use the accusative and dative prepositions.

4. To exhibit use of the **<u>SURVIVAL LANGUAGE SKILLS</u>** needed when visiting or living in a German-speaking country, e.g., counting, telling time, communicating personal information, describing daily activities, shopping, etc.

5. To be able to carry on minimal **SOCIAL CONVERSATIONS**, such as asking for the time, asking for directions, buying clothing or food, conveying personal information or talking about the weather.

6. To <u>LISTEN</u> to and comprehend standard German spoken at average speed by native speakers by concentrating on known vocabulary and making educated guesses at the rest.
7. To <u>SPEAK</u> without notes (or read aloud) standard German with a minimum of pronunciation errors and still be understood by a native speaker.

8. To **<u>READ</u>** and comprehend standard German by concentrating on known vocabulary and cognates and through the use of contextual guessing. With the assistance of a dictionary, to be able to comprehend a high percentage of standard German.

9. To <u>WRITE</u> at a survival level in standard German with a minimim of grammatical errors and to still be understood by a native speaker.

More than one unexcused absence will result in a reduction of your participation / attendance grade by 10% (one full letter grade) per infraction. **Homework** will be graded on a system of +, ++, +++. You will receive a "plus" for turning in your assignment, two "pluses" for turning it in completed and on time, and three "pluses" for turning it in on time, completed and substantially correct. Unless otherwise instructed you will be expected to complete all the workbook and lab exercises. **Quizzes** will generally be announced 1-2 days in advance, but not always. **Chapter exams** will be based on all material in the textbook which was discussed in class and may include a

short listening component or dictation. **Oral exams** (2) will be conducted in person in my office or via telephone. ***There is no extra credit for this course**.

SCHEDULE. During the fall semester we will cover the introductory chapter (*Einführung*) through *Kapitel* 5 according to the following schedule. This schedule is tentative and at times may vary by a day or two. Detailed and specific information pertaining to each class period will be posted on a regular basis on the blackboard web site for this class.
