Course Description

This course is designed to meet the objectives of Component Area 2 of the core curriculum for non-business and nonscience related majors. Topics may include sets, counting principles, probability, logic, linear algebra, linear programming, mathematics of finance, geometry, and calculus. Applications are emphasized. Prerequisites: Two years of high school algebra and high school geometry.

Course Objectives

Students completing this course should have mastery of the following major concepts. Other techniques and ideas will also be covered:

- Set Theory
- Logic
- Counting Methods
- Probability
- Finance

Required Materials

- Time: Expect to spend a *minimum* of 6 hours per week to work on problems and studying for the tests and doing the projects.

Academic Dishonesty

All students are expected to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach. I also consider it disrespectful to wear any form of cover on your head, unless it is for religious purposes. Inappropriate behavior in the classroom shall result in a directive to leave class. Visitors in the Classroom

Unannounced visitors to class must present a current, official SHSU identification card to be permitted in the classroom. They must not present a disruption to the class by their attendance. If the visitor is not a registered student, it is at the instructor's discretion whether or not the visitor will be allowed to remain in the classroom.

This policy is not intended to discourage the occasional visiting of classes by responsible persons. Obviously, however, the visiting of a particular class should be occasional and not regular, and it should in no way constitute interference with registered members of the class or the educational process.
