• Course Description:

This course is designed to meet the objectives of Component Area 2 of the core curriculum for non-business and non-science related majors.

This course will be primarily lecture-oriented.

- Attendance Policy: Students are expected to attend every class. If class must be missed, the student is expected to get the notes from a classmate, check Blackboard and check student e-mail.

Students are expected to arrive to class on time. If a student is perpetually late, they will be asked not to attend class unless they arrive on time. If tardiness becomes a problem for the class as a whole, people who arrive late will not be permitted to enter the class. If this stricter policy becomes necessary, there will be an announcement made in class or posted on Blackboard under "Announcements".

• Assignments:

- 1. **Homework:** Homework may be assigned in class each day. Homework will not be collected every day, but students are encouraged to check their work with the solutions manual.
 - It is your responsibility to ask questions about homework problems which you were not able to complete or did not understand. It is your responsibility to come to office hours, or otherwise contact someone for help. It is also your responsibility to do as many problems from each section as you need to in order to feel comfortable with the material.
- 2. Quizzes: There may be frequent short quizzes, consisting of questions from the homework or the previous day's lecture. There will be no makeup quizzes, except for official University-sponsored activities.
- Exams: There will be four exams during the semester and a final exam. They are tentatively scheduled to occur on:

- Academic Dishonesty: All students are expected to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach. If the visitor is not a registered student, it is at the instructor's discretion whether or not the visitor will be allowed to remain in the classroom.

• Student Absences on Religious Holy Days Policy

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable time frame in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
