Course Description

This is an introductory criminal justice course designed to expose students to the diverse and complex criminal justice system. Students will acquire a thorough and comprehensive understanding of crime and justice in the United States and Texas, and will be encouraged to share viewpoints, opinions, and ask questions when discussing topics in class.

Course Objectives

The primary objectives of this course are:

- 1. Introduce the students to the laws, procedures, and policies involved in processing an offender through the criminal justice system.
- 2. Allow students to develop an understanding of roles and responsibilities of various officials involved in the court system processing offenders.
- 3. Examine the police role, the judicial system function, the correctional techniques used in dealing with offenders, and the juvenile justice system and how the judicial system functions in Texas.
- 4. Familiarize the students with the public's attitudes toward the offender and the resulting changes in laws, system policies, and legal practice..

Course Requirements

Exams – there will be 4 exams. Each will be worth 100 points. Each exam will include an additional 5 bonus points from subjects mentioned in the lecture.

Makeup Exam Policy

At the discretion of the professor, students who have documentation for a justified absence or illness of the student will be allowed to take a makeup exam one week from the original test date.

However, it will be up to the Professor's discretion whether it qualifies as an excused absence or is considered unexcused. It is the responsibility of the student to sign the roll sheet. Failure to sign the roll sheet will be considered as an absence. Falsely signing the roll sheet will be an automatic failure of the course.

Class Behavior

All cell phones will be turned off. No text messaging will be allowed. Talking amongst each other, reading a newspaper or eating will not be tolerated. You may be excused from the class for any of the above disruptions.

Students in this class will be challenged to welcome and embrace diversity of opinion. Personal attacks against another's belief system will not be tolerated. They will be identified as such by the professor (or any other class participant who senses that discussions have moved to a personal level) and stopped. Students who continue to engage in personal level challenges will first be counseled by the professor; but may ultimately be dropped from the class.
