COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an examination of the history and development of the structures of the American musical. It is designed to familiarize the student with the genre of musical theatre, highlighting its evolution as an American stage tradition.

CLASS ASSIGNMENTS:

- 1. Students will be given a list of topics for each area of study covered in class. Students will be asked to prepare a brief informational sketch about each topic. This information should be kept in a notebook. The information will appear on class quizzes and in performance presentations.
- 2. Class time will allow for viewing of and listening to recorded footage of historical performances. Students will be expected to record the names of the performers and performances in a notebook. The information will appear on class quizzes.
- 3. Students will be asked to attend the SHSU production of *Full Monty*, one off campus professional musical theatre production and one additional musical theatre production. Students will be asked to write a 3-5 page response for each production viewed. Late papers will not be accepted. Papers should be typed and double-spaced; Times New Roman or Arial font size 12, with one-inch margins and MLA formatting.
- 4. Students will be given the opportunity to present a final 15-minute lecture performance on a topic selected from a list of topics prepared by Dr. Avery. Students will be required to write a paper to accompany to the performance. The paper should be 10 pages in length. Late papers will not be accepted. Papers should be typed and double-spaced; Times New Roman or Arial font size 12, with one-inch margins and MLA formatting. The presentation should include moments of lecture and performance. Group presentation is permitted.
- 5. Students' success in the class is based on daily preparation and participation. If you don't attend, you can't contribute and your grade will suffer.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

If you are absent from more than **three** (3) classes, your final grade will be reduced by **two** (2) points for <u>each</u> absence. Tardiness is unacceptable. If you are tardy **three** (3) times, that equals **one absence**. Excessive tardiness will result in a reduction of your final grade.
