Course Description: The economic role of government, public finance and taxation, unemployment and inflation, national income theory, money and banking, economic fluctuations and growth, and international trade and finance.

Learning Objectives: After completion of this course, the student should learn the basic terminology of economics and methods of analysis. Further, the student will have learned to:

- understanding the concept of opportunity cost, and applying it to economic problems.
- becoming familiar with and utilizing the competitive market model.
- employing simple macroeconomic models to explain fluctuations in income and output.
- identifying and describing the determinants of income and output growth over the long run.
- understanding the transition of aggregate output from the short run to the long run.
- becoming familiar with the U.S. monetary system, monetary policy, and foreign exchange rates.
- understanding the link between savings, investment, government deficits, and foreign trade.

Further, students should learn to apply course material to understand "real world" economic problems and critically evaluate economic ideas, arguments, and points of view.

This grading scale is subject to change, but the cut-offs will never be raised. *No extra-credit* will be given. You are responsible for properly completing each assignment and submitting them promptly.

Exams: All exams will consist of multiple choice and/or short answer/essay questions and include material covered in class and material in the required text. A Scantron form 815-E or 882-E is required for all multiple choice exams. When computing your final average, some exam scores (the lowest exam scores, excluding the final exam and exams where the student is caught cheating) will be omitted.

- The final must be taken by everyone enrolled in the course, and will not be excluded from your final average for any reason.
- No make-up exams will be given.
- Cell phones may not be used during exams for any reason. You may only use a non-programmable, four-function calculator for exams.

The student is responsible for clearly annotating answers on their scanforms. Any errors found, after grading, will not be reversible. Therefore, the student should take the time to double-check their scanforms. If a student has a dark erasure or any other mar that may inhibit grading, notify the instructor as the exam is turned-in, and the instructor will hand grade the exam.

Homework/Quizzes: Homework/Quizzes will consist of multiple choice and short answer/essay questions and homework/quizzes may be unannounced. Late homework/quizzes will not be accepted and make-up homework/quizzes will not be given. If you miss a class or are late to class the day homework/quiz is assigned, you cannot turn-in that homework/quiz assignment – you will receive a zero for that assignment. There are zero exceptions to this policy. You may only use a non-programmable, four-function calculator for quizzes.

If you cannot attend class, you can turn-in your homework/quiz via email or voicemail only before the start of class on the date the assignment is due. Homework/quiz sent via email/voicemail must be received before the regular class meeting. This policy is intended for emergencies - if you abuse this policy and have excessive absences, your homework/quiz will only be accepted at the beginning of class and be contingent upon your attendance for that class. If you turn-in your homework/quizzes via any other method than that listed above, i.e. class turn-in, email or voicemail, you will receive a zero for that assignment. For example, I will not accept a homework/quiz that is placed under my door. This policy may be changed at the instructor's discretion as needed during the semester. A Scantron form 882-E or 815-E may be required for homework/quiz assignments.

An unannounced quiz may be given

- for each use of a cell phone,
- audible ring/buzz (audible to the instructor) from a cell phone,
- if the instructor believes a student is text messaging,
- and/or any other cell phone created disturbance (disturbs the instructor).

There are no make-ups for these quizzes. The quizzes will cover any material already presented during the semester and/or to be presented for the day.

- Class Attendance Policy: Students are expected to attend *all* classes. Regular and punctual class attendance is expected of each student. Students that are late for class will be counted as absent. *Absent students or students that arrive late to class may not turn-in homework/quiz assignments that are due or make-up homework/quizzes.* You must notify the instructor in advance if a prolonged absence is imminent or expected. You may be allowed to take a scheduled exam early at the instructor's discretion. Further, if you are having difficulties that might interfere with your performance in this class, notify your instructor immediately.
