Course Catalog Description:

AGR 385 Agricultural Economic Analysis. This course presents analysis tools from the fields of economics, statistics, and management as they relate to agricultural business decision making. The analytical and quantitative principles are applied to a variety of agricultural business situations. Topics include forecasting, decision analysis, and linear programming. Computer-based methods are emphasized. Prerequisite: STA 169 or MTH 199, AGR 238. (3-0), Credit 3.

Text: Quantitative Analysis for Management, 9th ed. by Render, Stair, and Hanna. We will also use internet readings, handouts, and other material placed on Blackboard or on reserve in the library. This text is **required**. So is a calculator – every class!

Internet and email access, as well as Microsoft Excel are required resources for this course. Those without personal internet access or Excel can use the many computing facilities offered by SHSU.

All email correspondence and homework turned in by email **MUST** have the subject line beginning with *AGR 385*, followed by the actual subject. Additionally, all homework submissions by email **MUST** be submitted as an MS Office compatible attached file. Homework done in the body of the email will not be accepted. Period. If you choose to submit work electronically, it is your responsibility to ensure that you submit it with enough time to arrive in my inbox before the due date/time. Email is not instantaneous!

Objectives: The course is intended to:

- Introduce students to the use of statistics in agribusiness decision making.
- Introduce students to principles and practices useful in the analysis of agribusiness information.
- Improve the ability of students to understand principles and tools relevant to agribusiness decision-making.
- Use the Microsoft Excel Solver to solve constrained problems (LP).

Participation: Students are expected to attend class, to arrive on time, and to participate in class discussions. Students are encouraged to ask questions and provide comments.

The instructor reserves the right to curve grades at the end of the semester.

- Examinations: Exam format will vary and may consist of objective questions (T/F, M/C), short answer, essay, and mathematical/ graphical analysis. Questions will come from material in lectures, assigned textbook chapters, and other readings taken from handouts and Internet sites. If the student must miss an exam, the student must inform the instructor in advance and obtain approval. Make-up exams will not be given. If an absence is officially excused, the grade earned on the final exam will also count for the missed exam.
- Homework and in-class assignments: Homework and in-class assignments (including pop quizzes) will be given from time to time during the course of the semester. The lowest score from these assignments will be dropped in calculating the homework grade for the semester. A pop quiz is likely any time a cell phone rings in class! I believe that homework is for learning, so I do not assign many problems. If you can do the assignments without trouble, great. If you struggle, that is **your** sign that you need to work more problems from the end of the chapter. There are lots of good ones at the end of each chapter.

Attendance Policy Department attendance policy will be strictly enforced. Attendance will be taken each class period.

Department of Agricultural Sciences Attendance Policy

1. Regular and punctual attendance is expected of each student in the Department of Agricultural and Industrial Sciences at Sam Houston State University.

6. No exams or assignments will be given at alternative times unless arrangements are made with the professor/instructor before the scheduled activity occurs.

Academic Dishonesty All students are expected to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach. Students are expected to maintain complete honesty and integrity in the academic experiences both in and out of the classroom. Any student found guilty of dishonesty in any phase of academic work will be subject to disciplinary action. The University and its official representatives may initiate disciplinary proceedings against a student accused of any form of academic dishonesty including, but not limited to, cheating on an examination or other academic work which is to be submitted, plagiarism, collusion and the abuse of resource materials.

Classroom Rules of Conduct Students will refrain from behavior in the classroom that intentionally or unintentionally disrupts the learning process and, thus, impedes the mission of the university. Cellular telephones and pagers must be turned off before class begins.
