Expectations:

- Debate topics will assigned to groups
- Groups will have a minimum of 15 minutes for opening comments to converse their position (Pro or Con) of the issue and may provide supplemental materials (PowerPoint, pictures, documents, videos)
- Groups must provide a thorough opening discussion
- Each group will have 15 minutes for closing comments
- Groups must provide thorough and relevant closing comments
- Questions will be asked from non-debating students
- Non presenting students will engage in class discussion and must submit a summation document of their personal assessment of the issue
- Each group will be both peer (25%) and instructor (75%) evaluated

Critique and Evaluation forms:

- Will be provide by the instructor and must be turned in at the end of the class period
- Evaluations and comments should be constructive
