Course Description

Principles of Sociology is designed to provide an introduction to the science of Sociology. This course will introduce students to the fundamental theories (both classical and contemporary), research methods, and concepts in the discipline.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of SOC 131, students will have increased their understanding of:

- the different theoretical perspectives that are used to guide the study of society;
- the numerous research methods that are used in the study of society;
- the various sociological concepts that are pertinent to the study of society; and,
- the assorted historical and contemporary issues associated with the study of society in the United States and throughout the world.

In addition, students will have demonstrated their ability to download computer files, create Word files, send files as attached documents, and search the internet.

Requirements and Grading

Regular and punctual class attendance is expected of each student at SHSU. Detailed information on the class attendance policy will be provided during the first class meeting.

Part of the tradition of higher education is the need to evaluate performance. Each student's final course grade will be based upon his/her performance on the following requirements:

Quizzes (20 points each)

Twelve quizzes will be administered throughout the semester. Grades will be calculated using the highest scores from 10 of the 12 quizzes. In other words, the two lowest quiz grades will not count toward the final course grade. Detailed information on the quizzes will be provided during the first class meeting.

Exams (100 points each)

There will be two in-class exams. Each exam will consist of multiple choice and true/false questions. Detailed information on the exams will be provided during the first class meeting.

NOTE 1: Quiz and exam questions will be drawn from the textbook, the videos/films, and the in-class discussions.

NOTE 2: Make-up date for ALL missed quizzes and exams is May 5, 2008.

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose.
