Course Description

This course is designed to instruct students on the relationship between psychology and the legal system. Various topics in forensic psychology will be discussed, including eyewitness testimony, confessions, profiling, jury research, psychology of criminal behavior, forensic assessment (civil and criminal), malingering and capital punishment.

Course Objectives

1. Students will gain an understanding of the role that psychologists play in the legal system and the influence of psychological testimony in the courtroom.
2. Students will become familiar with current psychological research and how it relates to case law and the legal system.
3. Students will learn about important issues in forensic assessment, including assessment of competence, assessment of insanity, risk assessment and malingering.

Course Requirements

Course grades will be determined by performance on four exams and one research paper. The following grading system will be used for all exams, the research paper, and the final course grade: (A = 100-90%, B = 89-80%, C = 79-70%, D = 69-60%, F = 59-0%).

Exams

Four non-cumulative exams will be administered during this course. The format for each exam will be multiple choice and each exam will be worth 100 points.

Research Paper

Each student will submit a 5-page paper on a specific topic in the area of psychology and law. The paper will be due May 2. Additional information on the requirements and format of the paper will be distributed in class.

Attendance Policy

Attendance in class is expected and required. Exams are heavily weighted toward material covered in lectures. In keeping with university policy, 3 absences are allowed without any penalty. Four or more absences will result in a grade reduction.

Religious Holidays

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911(a)(2) defines religious holy days as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20, Tax Code" A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence. University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s).

Academic Honesty

Any student found guilty of dishonesty in any phase of academic work will be subject to disciplinary action.
