Class Description:

[HIST 2312] A survey of world history since sixteenth century. Special attention is given to European expansion overseas, imperialism and colonization, the Industrial Revolution, the Enlightenment, the French Revolution, nineteenth century nationalism and democracy, and the colonial rebellions in Africa, Latin America, and Asia. Such 20th century problems as World War I, World War II, the Cold War, and the collapse of the Soviet Union are also considered. Recommended as the second half of a basic history course for all liberal arts majors. Credit 3.

Class Objectives

- A) to obtain a working familiarity with the major civilization zones of the modern world;
- B) to review the interaction of the different culture zones since 1500;
- C) to understand the rapid transformation of world societies and economies since 1500;

Grading: On multiple occasions during the semester you will take a written exam. There will NOT be a comprehensive final. The last test of the semester will cover chapters only since the previous midterm. Each day there MAY BE quizzes based on the textbook and/or in-class readings. I will drop your lowest quiz grade BUT NOT test grades. Attendance affects your grade. The formula for the grade will be as follows:

Quiz Avg. (50%) + Test Avg. (50%) - Class Participation/Attendance = Grade

Your final grade will be A=90-100; B=80-89; C=70-79; D=60-69; F= 59 or below

Make-up Policy: The daily quizzes are never made up. That's part of the reason you have drops for them. The in-class reaction papers are sporadically scheduled, like pop-quizzes and are also never made up. You may make up a missed mid-term examination with a documented, university approved excuse. When in doubt about your grades or work, always ask me.

Attendance: You may miss TWO (2) full classes without any penalty. For three to five absences, I will deduct 3 points from your final grade for each day .. If you miss six or more classes you cannot pass, regardless of your scores on your other work

"Religious holy day" means a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20, Tax Code.

Visitors in the Classroom

Unannounced visitors to class must present a current, official SHSU identification card to be permitted into the classroom. They must not present a disruption to the class by their attendance. If the visitor is not a

registered student, it is at the instructor's discretion whether or not the visitor will be allowed to remain in the classroom.
