Catalog Description: This course is a study of large-scale parallel processing systems. The central themes are theoretical models, machine architecture, computer algorithms, and programming languages that model, support, describe and implement parallel processing.

Prerequisite: CS 574

Methodology: Lecture with outside laboratory assignments. The examinations will cover the material in the lectures, and will require that the student understand, apply, and extend that knowledge.

Objectives: This course provides a basic, in-depth look at techniques for the design and analysis of parallel algorithms and for programming them on commercially available parallel platforms. Principles of parallel algorithms design and different parallel programming models are both discussed. MPI, POSIX threads, and Open MP will all be discussed. This course is for anyone wanting to gain proficiency in all aspects of parallel and distributed programming.

Required Textbook and Supplies:

Grading: There will be 2 major exams during the course of the semester. Each of these will count as 25% of the total grade. Makeup exams must be scheduled with the professor within a week of the missed exam. A makeup exam will not necessarily cover identical material to the missed exam, and may be of a different format and difficulty level. There will be a final exam which will count as 25% of the grade. There will be several homework and lab assignments which will count as 25% of the grade.
