Course Description

This course will introduce students to the fundamental principles of information access, search, retrieval and transfer. Emphasis will be placed on the basic tools and skills of library research as well as the technologies that facilitate access to information. The course will include introduction to and developing specific skills with the use of Microsoft Word, Excel, PowerPoint, email, and use of the Internet.

Course Requirements

1. A number of assignments will be given throughout the semester. Assignments may take the form of worksheets, exercises, quizzes. Students are required to complete the assignments and turn them in when due.
2. Semester project: Students will begin using the information presented in class to design and construct an annotated bibliography. The document will be modified throughout the semester as new resources and skills are developed. This project is your final exam.
3. Attendance is required.
